## **GOAL GUN LAW SEMINAR**

In order to continue to provide programs of interest to our membership, on Tuesday night, April 1<sup>st</sup> the Franklin County Sportsman's Club was visited by Jon Greene of GOAL, who outlined the Chapter 135 gun law changes effective October, 2024. We had 35 members in attendance, and all expressed their satisfaction with the presentation and information/ handouts presented. These new provisions became the law of the land on this date, due to our Governor, who I'm sure was only looking out for our well-being, when signed an executive order; she was fearful the citizens of Massachusetts would gather the necessary signatures to stop the implementation of these changes. Thankfully, 96,000 citizens of Massachusetts saw these new gun laws would, once again, do nothing to stop crime, but infringe on our Second Amendment rights. Thankfully, we now have a question



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added to the November 2026 ballot, allowing the people to vote. You would think this would be the democratic way of dealing with issues, but the dictator felt otherwise.

This two-and-a-half hour presentation was very informative and upsetting as many of the changes now make the law-abiding gun owners of Massachusetts criminals. Thank you very much, Governor. Thankfully, a majority of these changes are not going into effect until a later date or are so unenforceable that the Colonel of the MA State Police has no idea how to enforce them. I'm sure they will find a way to limit Second Amendment rights soon enough. To be totally honest, a few changes will benefit Massachusetts gun owners, but not many. One item of interest is that the sale of ammunition is now legal by one LTC holder to another LTC holder. This was not allowed before. One item everyone should know now is that large capacity magazines and feeding devices manufactured prior to September 14, 1994 cannot be carried / possessed on a public way. They must be transported unloaded in a separate locked container. Simply if you carry a firearm, the magazine must not be able to exceed 10 rounds capacity – pre-ban or not. Pre-ban status does not apply anymore.

Starting in October 2026 every firearm you have in your possession must be registered with the state firearms registration system. If you have a passed-down firearm from your father or grandfather, they want to know about it. All firearms purchased in NH, or other firearm-friendly states, will also need to be registered. If, for some reason, the police have to come into your home and find a non-registered firearm, you will be in trouble.

Jon mentioned multiple times the safe storage of firearms, whether you have children or anyone else in the home. Store them properly in a locked gun safe or other approved storage device. There have been multiple individuals who have gotten in hot water for gun storage issues in the eastern part of the state. Bottom line, lock them up.

## **Shooting Range Etiquette**



Safety on our rifle range depends upon many behaviors. One of these is maintaining line-of-sight from end to end of the firing line. It is important that everyone on the line be able to observe all other shooters on the line. There is a grassy patch between the main firing line and the wooden platform which extends the firing line. That patch of grass may seem like an inviting place to park, but parking there obstructs the vision of other shooters on the line. We need to maintain line-of-sight on the firing line from one end to the other. Please park your vehicle in the parking lot *in front of* the rifle range. Parking there will help us maintain maximum safety for all shooters on the firing line. Thank you. Larry Kleinschmidt

The course of fire was 6 steel plates at 10 yards. At the beep placing 1 shot on the first 3 plates, reload and firing 1 shot on the next 3 plates strong hand only. After running the drill 3 times, we increased the



difficulty to 2 shots per plate reload at number three, and 2 shots strong hand only for the last 3 plates.

It was a very nice day, with five shooters in the group. One new woman joined us to practice her skills and was impressive. We hope she returns for more of our sessions.

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## How to Deal with Snake Bite!

In the United Staes approximately 7,000 to 8,000 people are bitten by venomous snakes yearly, with about five dying.

In the Commonwealth of Massachusetts on average there are two people bitten by venomous snakes annually. There are only two known species of venomous snake in Massachusetts, the Copperhead and the Timber Rattlesnake.

There seems to be a lot of "old wives' tales" about treating a venomous snake bite. From an article in the magazine "Sports Afield" from 1970 the list of dos and don'ts looks very similar to the list from the "ASCLEPIUS Snakebite Foundation." It is almost identical 55 years later. The big differences are calling 911 with your cellphone (neither of which existed in 1970), and they no longer recommend refrigerating or putting on ice the body part that was bitten.

<u>Snake bite Prevention:</u> Wear protective footwear. Avoid areas where snakes live, and don't handle snakes.

#### FIRST AID RECOMMENDATIONS (By Hypothermia)

- Apply fresh-water ice to the site of the bite as soon as possible. If no ice is immediately available, substitute one of the canned coolants until ice can be obtained. If possible, immerse the entire extremity in ice water until victim reaches the hospital. A cold mountain stream should not be overlooked as a substitute. Most outdoorsmen and campers have some kind of refrigeration in their vehicles, and if a plane or 'copter is summoned to the rescue, the pilot should be directed to bring a supply of ice and a container deep enough for a leg or arm (96 percent of bites are on the extremities).
  - **2** Except for the refrigerated part, keep the rest of the victim's body warm.
  - **3** The patient should be hospitalized as soon as possible.
  - 4 The patient should be induced to drink copiously of fluids that are *not* stimulants.

**5** The patient, while exerting himself as little as possible, should be reassured that the incidence of death from snakebite is minimal, and that with the proper use of hypothermia, his chances of keeping his extremities are now greatly enhanced.

This brief list does not mention use of the tourniquet. There is still a wide difference of opinion among experts regarding its use, and because it can be damaging, its use by the layman is not recommended. If applied, it should be removed immediately after the application of refrigeration.

Snakebite effects

- Snakebites can cause paralysis, bleeding disorders, kidney failure, and tissue damage.
- Children are often more severely affected than adults.



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- Venomous snake workers are more likely to suffer long-term injuries than to die from snake bites.
- Wash the wound with soap and water.
- Get antivenom as soon as possible.

Should you run into a snake, back away quickly to get away from them. Enjoy the outdoors, but do it with your eyes open. Tim Houle
