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MOA Explained

Minute of Angle (MOA) is an angular measurement used in shooting to describe a rifle's ability to group bullet hits on a target. A circle consists of 360 degrees, and a minute of angle is 1/60th of a degree in the circle. The MOA varies based on the distance to the target. At 100 yards, one MOA is 1.047 inches. Typically, in shooting calculations, we use 1 inch at 100 yards, 2 inches at 200 yards, 3 inches at 300 yards, etc. Modern rifle scopes are typically adjusted using the MOA scale. It is common to see scope adjustments measured in ½ MOA increments. That means that it takes four clicks of adjustment to move the point-of-aim by one inch at 100 yards. When your target is at 200 yards, this calculation changes (remember 1 MOA

is 2 inches at 200 yards). So, at 200 yards, a 1/4 MOA adjustment is 1/2 inch, and so forth as the distance gets longer. Understanding MOA makes it easy to make quick adjustments to point-of-aim when zeroing in a rifle. It is also a way of expressing the accuracy of a rifle, i.e. "this rifle shoots sub-MOA groups at 200 yards...". That means that if you shoot a group of rounds at 200 yards with this particular rifle, the group will be in a circle smaller than 2 inches on the target (2 inches being 1 MOA at 200 yards). 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New Rimfire Challenge Event!

We'd like to start a regular Rimfire Challenge event at the Club in July. It's a speed shooting event using 22LR semi-automatic pistols and rifles. Here are the basics:

• Typically 4 or 5 Courses of Fire (COF)

(A course of fire consists of 5 to 7 steel plates. The competitor will shoot 5 strings. The 4 lowest-timed strings will be totaled as the score.)

- Plates are repainted for each competitor
- Competitors are grouped into squads, 1 squad at each COF. All squads rotate through all COF's.
- The match is shot with both Pistol and Rifle, .22LR ONLY
- The match score is the combined Pistol and Rifle time.



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The Allan Parda Story

In an effort to share some of the history of the Franklin County Sportsmen's Club with the membership, I've been asked to give some information on the



member memorialized by the stone in front of the flagpole at the club. His name was Alan Parda, and he and many others gave their time and energy so that we can enjoy the facility we have today. Alan was a true sportsman who loved to hunt and was involved in every aspect of the shooting sports. He was an excellent skeet shooter, and a member of the Deerfield Trap and Skeet Club when the club was the Franklin County League of Sportsmen prior to the reorganization to what we have now. He

was also a member of the Turners Falls Rifle and Pistol Club, where every Thursday night he enjoyed shooting handguns and rifles with precision. He seemed to like the big calibers and could be seen shooting his favorite, an S&W Model 29 in 44 Magnum, on most nights.

He was instrumental in establishing our once popular sporting clays course, which went through the woods at the end of the rifle range parking area. His time at the club was shortened when he was diagnosed with cancer which eventually took his life. Lastly, Alan was my friend and is dearly missed. Per the request of his wife, who knew his



love for the club, we gladly approved the placement of a stone in his memory. Please give it a look.

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Range Etiquette - Tinnitus

Tinnitus? What has that to do with the range? Our sport is very, very noisy! Hearing protection is an absolute necessity. Tinnitus results from prolonged exposure to loud sounds without adequate hearing protection. Here are some facts about tinnitus which will motivate you to care about your hearing protection.

Tinnitus is the perception of ringing, buzzing, or other noises in the ears. It affects millions of people. It is often accompanied by hearing loss. It has a significant impact upon quality of life! A common cause of tinnitus (especially among soldiers) is exposure to loud noise. This ties it directly to our shooting sports, which generate loud and shocking noise. Prolonged exposure to loud sounds can damage the delicate hair cells in the inner ear, leading to hearing loss and, consequently, tinnitus. The shock of loud noise causes damage to these delicate hair cells located in the cochlea, which is inside the inner ear, behind the ear drum. These cells are crucial for normal hearing and balance, and damage to them can lead to hearing loss and/or balance problems. Once these hair cells are damaged, they can never be restored, and when damaged, the sound levels they normally generate can no longer be heard. Instead of the normal sound, one hears an odd and usually constant sound throughout one's lifetime. (In my case, the sound I hear is the squeal of a punctured loud speaker; this sound is constant during all waking hours).

So be very careful with your hearing protection. Make sure it is adequate to muffle the sound that is created when you shoot. Also, make sure that those around you have hearing protection before you fire. Your hearing, and maybe your sanity, depend upon it.




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Alaska Moose Hunt, 1973!
