President's Notes

Well, here we are at the end of May, the socalled start of summer. We have already held four shoots of the many scheduled on our calendar of events. Our 223-caliber rifle shoots remain very popular, and, due to demand, the 22-rimfire shoots have been expanded to once a month through October. I'm hoping we have more shooters come out for our 200-yard center fire shoots. All the events show that people are interested, so we'll will continue through October. Please come down and get involved. You will not be disappointed. Check the club's calendar for a list of events scheduled.



In case you are not already aware, the Franklin County Sportsmen's Club is the finest facility in the area. Well-maintained, and any firearm you have can be shot safely. I want to remind everyone to pay attention to the posted signs indicating what calibers are appropriate on the ranges. Please do not shoot the steel plates on the rifle range with 338 Lapua or any large-caliber round. These rounds have recently caused significant damage to the plates and the hangers. We incurred costs in the amount of \$60.00 to replace one plate and hanger last week. Shooting at a paper target with these rounds is fine, but they are too powerful to shoot steel at the short distances we have at the club.

Recently we surveyed our property in the front at the road to confirm the boundaries with our two neighbors. We found that we own a large area abutting the farmhouse to the right of our River Road entrance. We are working on a plan to clean up this additional property in the fall. More on this in future later newsletters.

Historical Arm Show & Tell Event


We held an Historical Arms Show & Tell on Saturday, May 25th, at 2PM. It was

My First Gun

Tim H., a career firefighter of 37 years and paramedic of 28 years, is a new FCSC member and a newer shooter. "Before 2021", Tim says, "I had only shot .22 rifles in the Boy Scouts and shot a handgun once about fifteen years ago". It was Tim's wife, Rebecca, who got him interested in shooting. After Tim and Rebecca were married in 2019, she told him that she used to enjoy hunting and recreational and



competitive shooting (IDPA competitions). She wondered if he might like to try shooting. Well, she did not have to ask Tim twice! "I took a class and got my LTC in 2020, during COVID," Tim says. Strangely (but those were strange times!), his LTC paperwork was processed in a month and a half, much faster than the usual wait!

Tim researched handguns extensively online. He narrowed his choice down to several models, but due to the short supply of handguns during COVID he was not able to handle the guns to see which one might be right for him. Finally, in 2021, Tim and Rebecca drove out to Pete's Gun Store in Adams, where Tim was able to handle the handguns he had been looking at online. "The handgun that

felt most comfortable to me was the Smith and Wesson M&P 2.0 9mm. That's what I bought, and Rebecca got the sub-compact version of the same gun."

Tim and Rebecca joined FCSC in 2022. Tim has tried to come down to shoot once or twice a week, either with Rebecca or on his own. After putting about 2,000 rounds through his M&P 2.0, he decided he was not satisfied with the long trigger pull and trigger reset, so he had the factory trigger replaced with an aftermarket Apex trigger. "This made a huge difference," Tim says. "My accuracy improved a lot!"

Tim now has a number of handguns (Colt, Sig Sauer, Smith & Wesson), including a revolver. He also owns several long guns. He just started a new position and no longer has days off during the week. "I hope I'm still able make it to the club once or twice a week like I've been doing," Tim says.

I suspect he has the will and I suspect he will find a way! Mark St Amand

Steve Crowningshield's Black Powder Rifle Build

Some years ago, I learned of the matchlock musket, in use by armies and hunters from England to Japan, and as far west as Jamestown in the New World. It was in service from the late 15th century through the early 19th century. The greatest difference between the matchlock and the



flintlock is the ignition; instead of flint and steel, ignition is obtained by a bit of smoldering rope or match, dropping into the flash pan.

I recently finished making a copy of a matchlock musket styled after examples used by the Ottoman Empire around the early16th century. I built it by hand from scrap pallet wood and salvaged steel from work projects. The only part not made by me was the CVA Hawken barrel. This makes it a rifled

musket, I suppose. For the test fire, I opted for a few shots with wads of newspaper until I was certain the new flash hole was suitable. Then came the round shot. I was very impressed with the seamless ignition and low recoil, an advantage with heavy guns. It's a step back in time; it also increases your respect for the people who used these rifles. I have read that a

good soldier could get off three shots in one minute. I think two is far more likely as the loading process and the gear of the day are cumbersome. Authentic rifles are longer and heavier than the carbine I have made. Like all things black powder, you have to like cleaning; but the history and experience are worth it. Steve Crowningshield
